3. Scope Of Works/Technical Specifications

3.1 BACKGROUND

The South African National Energy Development Institute (SANEDI) aims to collaborate with various South African Public Universities and Universities of Technology to conduct various energy research. The South African energy system is transitioning to address issues of reliability, system efficiency, emerging business models and environmental compliance with the decarbonisation of the national energy system. Therefore, there is an urgent need to conduct research that will propose solutions to support the transition to sustainable and cleaner technologies that ensures South Africa’s energy’s transition aspirations as contained in the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy’s Just Energy Transitions (JET) framework.

The objective of the framework is to provide a structure to monitor the socio-economic impacts of the transition and to support the decarbonisation of the minerals and energy sectors in a socially acceptable manner that secures the future and livelihoods of workers, their families and communities that depend on carbon energy sources, while contributing to the economic development of the country in line with the Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) 2019 targets until 2030.

3.2 OBJECTIVES OF THE SANEDI COLLABORATION PROGRAMME

3.2.1 Collaborate with Universities and Universities of Technologies on strategic areas.

3.2.2 Increase SANEDI and Academia’s capacity to perform research, development, and innovation within the energy space.

3.2.3 Leverage on the competencies and infrastructure of Universities and Universities of Technologies competencies and research infrastructure.

3.2.3 Build competencies within Universities and Universities of Technologies in the field of basic and applied energy research.

3.2.4 Develop centres of excellence with Universities and Universities of Technologies for future research work to support South Africa’s energy transition.

3.4 DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME AND PROJECTS PROPOSAL

3.4.1 SANEDI Just Energy Transition Research Programme in Collaboration with South African Universities and Universities of Technologies programme will run for a period of 3 years,

between April 2023 to December 2026. However, the programme duration factors in when collaboration agreements are signed, and projects kick-off for execution.

3.4.2 The proposed project duration must meet the following conditions:

3.4.1 Project proposal duration must be a minimum of 6 months, and a maximum of 24 months.

3.4.2 The project can be executed anytime from April 2023 to June 2026. The project can be executed in 2023, 2024, 2025, as long as the duration is less than 24 months and must be concluded by 30 June 2026.

3.4.3 The projects will have a minimum annual stage gate hold for projects exceeding one year, meaning second phase of the project in year 2 depends on the output of the first phase and if phase 2 is not viable, the second phase can be stopped.


3.5 OPERATING PRINCIPLE


SANEDI use enabling contract method (Tasks orders) to manage contracts. The tasks order will provide the University with the authority to proceed with the work and stipulate relevant details on the scope of work well within the submitted business case/s.

3.6 MINIMUM AND MAXIMUM FUNDING CONTRIBUTION

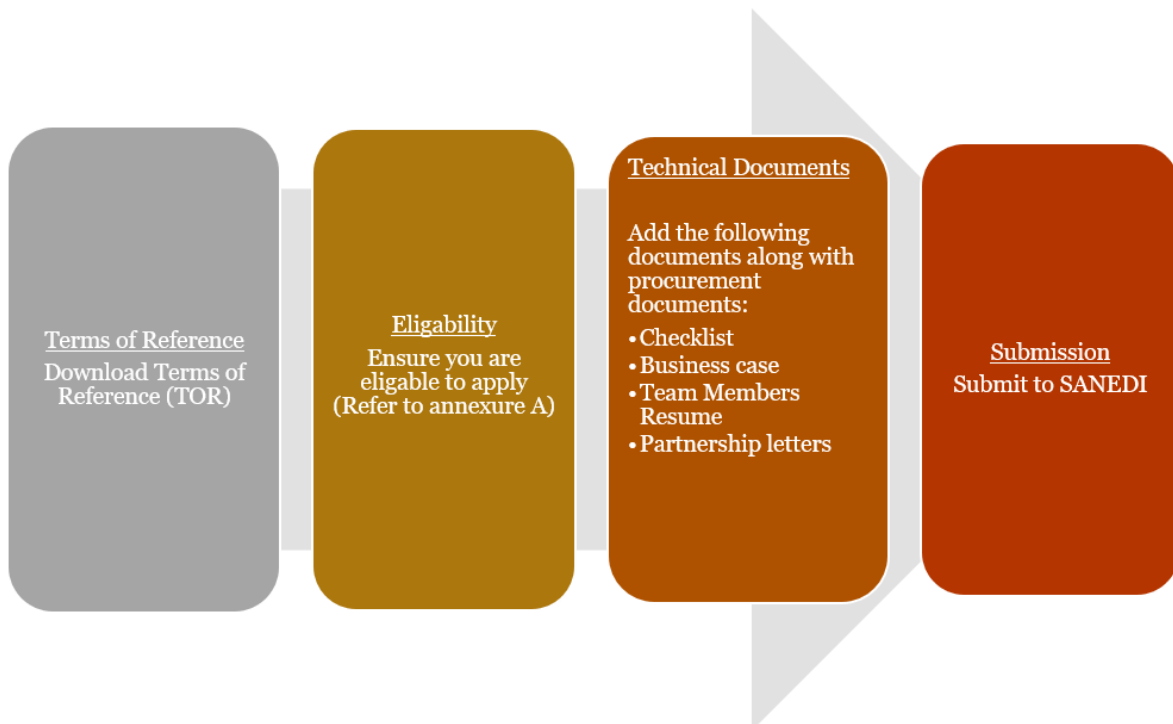
The **minimum** amount that can be applied for each proposal is **R1 000 000** and the **maximum amount** is **R9 000 000**. Proposals will be considered non-compliant if the requested amount, falls outside of the minimum or maximum amounts.

3.7 MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPLIANCE

1.1 The following preference point systems are applicable to invitations to tender: - the 80/20 system for requirements with a Rand value of up to R50 000 000 (all applicable taxes included); and - the 90/10 system for requirements with a Rand value above R50 000 000 (all applicable taxes included).

1.2 Preference Points applicable:

a) The applicable preference point system for this tender is the **80/20** preference point system.

1.3 Points for this tender shall be awarded for:

- (a) Price; and
- (b) Specific Goals.

1.4 The maximum points for this tender are allocated as follows:

1.5 Failure on the part of a tenderer to submit proof or documentation required in terms of this tender to claim points for specific goals with the tender, will be interpreted to mean that preference points for specific goals are not claimed.

1.6 SANEDI reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a tender is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the SANEDI.

2. DEFINITIONS

- (a) “tender” means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation to provide goods or services through price quotations, competitive tendering process or any other method envisaged in legislation;
- (b) “price” means an amount of money tendered for goods or services, and includes all applicable taxes less all unconditional discounts;
- (c) “rand value” means the total estimated value of a contract in Rand, calculated at the time of bid invitation, and includes all applicable taxes;
- (d) “tender for income-generating contracts” means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation for the origination of income-generating contracts through any method envisaged in legislation that will result in a legal agreement between the organ of state and a third party that produces revenue for the organ of state, and includes, but is not limited to, leasing and disposal of assets and concession contracts, excluding direct sales and disposal of assets through public auctions; and
- (e) “the Act” means the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act, 2000 (Act No. 5 of 2000).
- (f) “B-BBEE” means broad-based black economic empowerment as defined in section 1 of the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment Act;
- (g) “B-BBEE status level of contributor” means the B-BBEE status of an entity in terms of a code of good practice on black economic empowerment, issued in terms of section 9(1) of the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment Act;
- (h) “bid” means a written offer in a prescribed or stipulated form in response to an invitation by an organ of state for the provision of goods or services, through price quotations, advertised competitive bidding processes or proposals;
- (i) “Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment Act” means the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment Act, 2003 (Act No. 53 of 2003);
- (j) “EME” means an Exempted Micro Enterprise in terms of a code of good practice on black economic empowerment issued in terms of section 9 (1) of the Broad-Based Black Economic Empowerment Act;

- (k) “functionality” means the ability of a tenderer to provide goods or services in accordance with specifications as set out in the tender documents.
- (l) “proof of B-BBEE status level of contributor” means:
- B-BBEE Status level certificate issued by an authorized body or person;
 - A sworn affidavit as prescribed by the B-BBEE Codes of Good Practice;

3.1. POINTS AWARDED FOR PRICE

4. POINTS AWARDED FOR SPECIFIC GOALS

4.1. In terms of Regulation 4(2); 5(2); 6(2) and 7(2) of the Preferential Procurement Regulations, preference points must be awarded for specific goals stated in the tender. For the purposes of this tender the tenderer will be allocated points based on the goals stated in table 1 below as may be supported by proof/ documentation stated in the conditions of this tender:

4.2. In cases where organs of state intend to use Regulation 3(2) of the Regulations, which states that, if it is unclear whether the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system applies, an organ of state must, in the tender documents, stipulate in the case of—

(a) an invitation for tender for income-generating contracts, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the highest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system; or

(b) any other invitation for tender, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the lowest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system, then the organ of state must indicate the points allocated for specific goals for both the 90/10 and 80/20 preference point system.
